## **Balbirooroo Community Wetlands**

Did you know that Balbirooroo Community Wetlands has not always existed? In 1993 the Balnarring Primary School and broader communities set about creating this habitat for indigenous flora and fauna on former pasture land adjacent to the school. Two years of monthly working bees to excavate the wetland and dip net pond, plant thousands of indigenous plants and build the boardwalks, paths and bird hide is still an inspiring example of what a community, working together, can achieve.

The school continues to have a huge commitment to educating students and their families about sustainability and environmental stewardship and we are very proud to have supported their wetlands and sustainability program since 2010.

Balbirooroo Wetlands has become an extremely important wetland habitat, not only for the flora and fauna that both visit and live there, but for students and the whole community. In the 30 years since the school and local community created this area, it has gone from a paddock into a state-significant wetland, with surrounding woodlands. It has become an important educational tool for students to learn about how natural ecosystems function and the difference between weed and indigenous species. The wider community also enjoys this site, which helps educate them on the importance of natural ecosystems. Many threatened flora and fauna species now utilise this area and it is one of very few primary schools in Australia that can boast of having Koalas in their grounds.

# Balnarring Boomerang Bags – another of the wonderful groups we support

Boomerang Bags was created by two Australian women in 2013 to tackle plastic pollution at its source, diverting fabric waste from landfill, encouraging sustainable behaviour and having a bit of fun whilst fostering new friendships and connections.

Balnarring Boomerang Bag group began meeting to sew bags in 2017. Since then, they have sewn over 7,000 bags for shoppers, using recycled fabric from St Marks Op Shop and general donations.

The group works in 'The Shack' at Balnarring Primary School and has made dozens of bags and costumes for the school. Students at Balnarring are provided with a BEAT bag created by the group and through the school's science program

are taught the importance of recycling and given a list of recyclable items. They take great pride in collecting these from home and sorting them, knowing that they are doing their part to look after our environment. What a partnership.

The group is always looking for new volunteers, so maybe you could join the 6-8 locals who meet in 'The Shack' on Thursdays from 1.30pm, finishing in time for school pick-up, to sew bags (machines provided), cut fabric, iron or simply enjoy a chat and cuppa.

If it suits better, pick up some pre-cut kits to sew at home. Balnarring Boomerang Bags will pay for your machine to be serviced by our wonderful Somers sewing machine repair wizard. Rick Wise.









# Partnerships delivering for our natural environment

### Merricks Coolart Catchment Landcare group

Merricks-Coolart Catchment Landcare Group aims to protect the diversity and extent of natural ecosystems and species in the catchment and since 2018 our bank has invested over \$40,000 to support the significant revegetation achievements of



The group has recently begun a major revegetation partnership on 12 hectares of land, which will be protected under a Conservation Covenant, on the Presentation Sisters' property on Balnarring Beach Road. What a wonderful legacy the Presentation Sisters are creating.

This project will sequester an impressive 10 tonnes of carbon per hectare per year and provide vital additional indigenous habitat, so we were delighted to support it by funding the purchase of an All-Terrain Vehicle and trailer for carrying plants and equipment down to the site.

## Mornington Peninsula Koala Conservation

Since 2019, Mornington Peninsula Koala Conservation has worked to preserve our local koala population by creating a koala corridor connecting existing sections of habitat and food trees across the Mornington Peninsula.

Our Community Bank has invested \$35,400 since 2020/21 to help purchase indigenous trees and understorey vegetation for planting in existing koala corridors on private and public land in our district, encouraging koalas out of urban areas and away from the many threats they face.

Through the group, we have also recently supported the work of Jennie Bryant, a highly-regarded local wildlife carer, affectionately known as the "Koala Lady", who has dedicated the last 45 years of her life to wildlife rescue. As a volunteer, Jenny relies solely on donations to care for and rehabilitate sick and injured wildlife, so we were delighted to assist her invaluable contribution.

The 'Big Beach Clean Up Days' and launch of environmental campaigner Josie Jones' 'Hand Bin Program', over January at the beach communities of Flinders, Shoreham, Point Leo and Balnarring, was a wonderful initiative we were very pleased to support.

These events are designed to encourage community awareness and participation in the collection of beach litter and educate beach users about the serious damage that the build-up of litter and other rubbish causes to marine and beach environments. The Association



will encourage other beach communities to hold similar events, utilising and displaying Josie's Hand Bins. Well done everyone.

Talking of Josie Jones, her campaign to have Peninsula beaches cleaned by hand rather than mechanically, to more completely reduce litter, particularly plastic, has contributed to Mornington Peninsula Shire's recent decision to run a world first beach hand-cleaning trial over the next twelve months.

### Friends of Bill Carroll Reserve

Another hard-working group we support financially is the volunteers who look after Bill Carroll Reserve in Merricks. Their work complements that of the Merricks Beach Residents' Association to preserve the character and natural environment of the area.



The Reserve is named after the late Dr W.S. Carroll, a prominent advocate of environmental protection in Merricks Beach. It provides an educational resource and is a pleasant place to experience and enjoy the natural environment. The lagoon provides a safe habitat for frogs and waterbirds, which can be observed from the secluded bird hide. It is also a popular centre for community events, such the annual Picnic in the Park and annual Easter Egg Hunt, enjoyed by the whole community.

# Balnarring Community Child Care and water saving

Balnarring Community Child Care aims to embed sustainable practice across its operations and learning program. The installation of water tanks donated by a local family will assist with achieving these goals and enable the capture and storage of water on site.

The tanks will be used to educate children and their families about sustainable practice, whilst reducing mains water usage and providing children with more opportunities for water play.

## Young people making a big difference.

#### Western Port Secondary College Green Team.

Western Port Secondary College has been at the forefront of sustainability education and practice for many years.

A thriving Green Team club, working with Sustainability Coordinator Vaughan Sanderson, supports students to learn to grow food, participate in sustainability initiatives around the school and have another place for connecting with other students. They are currently rejuvenating the food garden beds for planting in term two.

Recently Green Team students attended the Mornington Peninsula Shire Student Environmentalist conference to showcase their work in the school and learn about environmental initiatives in other regional schools.

Sustainability is woven throughout the curriculum and the school is working towards the final star for 5-star certification as a Sustainable School. Several waste-free day events to educate the school community about waste reduction have been run and students have participated in revegetation around the grounds.

Students recently worked with Western Port Biosphere to learn about the rare mangrove ecosystems in the Western Port catchment. They planted mangroves, built seawalls, collected mangrove seeds for later replanting and learnt about the importance of these ecosystems for fish breeding grounds through filtering water, carbon sequestration and coastline protection.

With our support, students will be also be working with Merricks Coolart Catchment Landcare group on the revegetation project at the Presentation Sisters property. The partnerships and links for taking action continue to grow.
