Chairman's Report

For the year ending 30 June 2023

On behalf of the Board of Directors I have much pleasure in presenting the Annual Report of Bexley Financial Services Ltd for the Financial Year ending 30 June 2023. This is especially so as it has been a year of such impressive results:

- An after-tax profit of \$460,594 and
- Net Assets now of \$752,746.

It is important to note, however, that the results are, to a large extent, due to the Reserve Bank of Australia continuing to provide funds to commercial banks at extremely low interest rates while interest rates more generally increased. These very favourable conditions could not continue indefinitely and the banking environment has now returned to more normal levels. Future financial performance of our company can be expected to reflect this.

Fortunately, through the efforts of our staff led by Branch Manager, Anthony Georgiou, total banking business continued to grow and is now just on \$130 million. It did, however, become apparent that, at less than four full time equivalents, branch performance at this level could not be sustained. Accordingly, the Board approved the additional employment of a Customer Relationship Manager with the primary objective of improving the company's lending capability. Our Branch Staff are undoubtedly our greatest asset.

This healthier financial situation has also meant that in the past few months the Branch has gone through a major refurbishment and the process has now begun to list Bexley Financial Services Ltd shares on the Low Volume Share Market. Once complete Directors will be in a position to decide on the payment of our first dividend.

Finally, let me again thank my fellow directors for their ongoing support and sound advice which has itself been a significant factor in a year of such impressive performance.

Manager's Report

For the year ending 30 June 2023

The significant increase in interest rates over the past 12 months doubled the branch's income, which when coupled with sustained growth in the size of the business, delivered our most profitable annual result on record!

Pleasingly, our total banking book grew from \$120.3 million to \$129.3 million. This is a strong result, and gives the branch team a strengthened banking book to build upon in FY 23/24. Over the past four Financial Years, from June 2019 to June 2023, the total size of the business has grown by 34.69% (which translates to an average annual growth rate of 8.67%). The most impressive performance indicator this financial year, was the double-digit rate of growth in our customer numbers (11.1%), which was almost five times the bank's net customer growth rate target for the branch (2.33%).

Throughout the year, the branch team have continued to focus on customer retention, onboarding new customers, and on improving the quality of their banking conversations with new and existing customers. While we had good success in growing the deposits side of the business, the size of the total loans book decreased. Despite efforts to grow the branch lending pipeline, the loan book was impacted by a higher level of runoff – which was attributed to an increased dollar value of paid in full loan discharges (as customers capitalised on selling residential & investment properties at market peak, by repaying their loans as interest rates had just commenced rising). This was further compounded by a reduction in the number of formal loan approvals & settlements – as customers borrowing power was significantly curtailed by a rising interest rate environment (which inhibited existing and new customers ability to top up loans, refinance, or purchase).

To address re-balancing the size of our loans book proportionate to our total banking business, the Board approved the hiring of a Customer Relationship Manager (CRM) – the role of which is focused on acquiring new residential lending & servicing existing customers lending needs. Two CRMs were hired over the 5-month period from February 23 till July 23, but neither stayed on with any meaningful tenure. In August 23, Charbel Tobbagi, was confirmed in the CRM role, and our new CRM has now commenced writing his own loan applications. Charbel is a welcome addition to the Bexley Team, and we wish him every success in the role.

Customer Service Officer (CSO), Jini Choi, moved to Community Bank Strathfield in June 23, and was replaced by Susan Awad (a local resident with retail banking experience). Both our branch aligned business banking specialists - Steven Nguyen and Jim Hogg – also finished up with Bendigo Bank prior to the end of the financial year. I would like to wholeheartedly thank our branch staff: Tina, Isela, & Jini, and business banking specialists: Jim and Steven - for their impressive efforts throughout the financial year, and for going above and beyond to assist our customers with all their banking & financial needs.

To the volunteer directors of the Board of Bexley Financial Services Ltd, thank you for generously giving of your time and services to support our Community Bank. I would also like to acknowledge the support of the Bendigo and Adelaide Bank team, and our Regional Manager Yiota Isaias, throughout the year.

Most importantly to our valued customers and shareholders, we thank you for being our biggest advocates. Without you we would not exist, and we hope to continue to provide a level of customer service which exceeds your expectations. We encourage you to reach out to our team, for all your ongoing & future banking needs.

My main objectives for FY 23/24 are: to increase the number of lending applications and regularity of loan approvals, increase the total size of our loans book, grow the customer base to 2700 customers, and finalise our branch renovation/revamp.

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

The financial report covers Bexley Financial Services Limited as an individual entity. Bexley Financial Services Limited is a company limited by shares, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the economic entity in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Income tax

The income tax expense (income) for the year comprises current income tax expense (income) and deferred tax expense (income).

Current income tax expense charged to profit or loss is the tax payable on taxable income measured at the amounts expected to be paid to (recovered from) the relevant taxation authority.

Deferred income tax expense reflects movements in deferred tax asset and deferred tax liability balances during the year as well as unused tax losses.

Current and deferred income tax expense (income) is charged or credited directly to equity instead of profit or loss when the tax relates to items that are recognised outside profit or loss.

Except for business combinations, no deferred income tax is recognised from the initial recognition of an asset or liability where there is no effect on accounting or taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled and their measurement also reflects the manner in which the management expects to recover or settle the carrying amount of the related asset or liability. With respect to non-depreciable items of property, plant and equipment measured at fair value and items of investment property measured at fair value, the related deferred tax liability or deferred tax asset is measured on the basis that the carrying amount of the asset will be recovered entirely through sale. When an investment property that is depreciable is held by the company in a business model whose objective is to consume substantially all of the economic benefits embodied in the property through use over time (rather than through sale), the related deferred tax liability or deferred tax liability or deferred tax liability or deferred tax liability will be recovered entirely through use over time (rather than through sale), the related deferred tax liability or deferred tax liability or deferred tax liability or deferred tax asset is measured on the basis that the carrying amount of such property will be recovered entirely through use.

Where temporary differences exist in relation to investments in subsidiaries, branches, associates and joint ventures, deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognised where the timing of the reversal of the temporary difference can be controlled and is not probable that the reversal will occur in the foreseeable future.

Current tax assets and liabilities are offset where a legally enforceable right of set-off exists and it is intended that net settlement or simultaneous realisation and settlement of the respective asset and liability will occur. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset where: (a) a legally enforceable right of set-off exists; and (b) the deferred tax assets and liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority on either the same taxable entity or different taxable entities where it is intended that net settlement or simultaneous realisation and settlement of the respective asset and liability will occur in future periods in which significant amounts of deferred tax assets or liabilities are expected to be recovered or settled.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned on a first-in first-out basis.

The cost of manufactured products includes direct materials, direct labour and an appropriate portion of variable and fixed overheads. Overheads are applied on the basis of normal operating capacity. Costs are assigned on the basis of weighted average costs.

The cost of mining stocks includes direct material, direct labour, transportation costs and variable and fixed overhead costs relating to mining activities.

Land Held for Resale

Land held for development and resale is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes the cost of acquisition, development, foreign currency movements, borrowing costs and holding costs until completion of development. Borrowing costs, foreign currency movements and holding charges incurred after development are expensed. Profits are brought to account on the signing of an unconditional contract of sale.

Construction Contracts and Work in Progress

Construction work in progress is valued at cost, plus profit recognised to date less any provision for anticipated future losses. Cost includes both variable and fixed costs relating to specific contracts, and those costs that are attributable to the contract activity in general and that can be allocated on a reasonable basis.

Construction profits are recognised on the stage of completion basis and measured using the proportion of costs incurred to date as compared to expected total costs. Where losses are anticipated they are provided for in full.

Construction revenue has been recognised on the basis of the terms of the contract adjusted for any variations or claims allowable under the contract.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

a) Property

Freehold land and buildings are measured on the fair value basis, being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction. It is a policy of Bexley Financial Services Limited to have an independent valuation every three years, with annual appraisals being made by the directors.

The revaluation of freehold land and buildings has not taken account of the potential capital gains tax on assets acquired after the introduction of capital gains tax.

b) Plant and equipment

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining the recoverable amounts.

The cost of fixed assets constructed within Bexley Financial Services Limited includes the cost of materials, direct labour, borrowing costs and an appropriate proportion of fixed and variable overheads.

c) Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised leased assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives to Bexley Financial Services Limited commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Properties held for investment purposes are not subject to a depreciation charge. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not legal ownership, are transferred to Bexley Financial Services Limited are classified as finance leases. Finance leases are capitalised recording an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual value.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that ownership of the asset will be obtained or over the term of the lease. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability. Lease payments received reduce the liability.

Investments

Shares in listed companies held as current assets are valued at those shares' market value at each balance date. The gains or losses, whether realised or unrealised, are included in profit from ordinary activities before income tax.

Non-current investments are measured on the cost basis. The carrying amount of non-current investments is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of these investments. The recoverable amount is assessed from the quoted market value for listed investments or the underlying net assets for other non-listed investments.

The expected net cash flows from investments have not been discounted to their present value in determining the recoverable amounts.

Investments in Associates

The equity method of accounting has been applied and recognised in the financial statements in relation to all associated companies. An associated company is a company over which Bexley Financial Services Limited is able to exercise significant influence.

Interest in Joint Ventures

The share of assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses of joint venture operations are included in the appropriate items of the statements of financial performance and financial position. Details of the interests are shown in the Notes to Accounts.

Research and Development Expenditure

Research and Development costs are charged to profit from ordinary activities before income tax as incurred or deferred where it is expected beyond any reasonable doubt that sufficient future benefits will be derived so as to recover those deferred costs.

Deferred research and development expenditure is amortised on a straight line basis over the period during which the related benefits are expected to be realised, once commercial production is commenced.

Exploration and Development Expenditure

Exploration, evaluation and development expenditure incurred is accumulated in respect of each identifiable area of interest. These costs are only carried forward to the extent that they are expected to be recouped through the successful development of the area or where activities in the area have not yet reached a stage which permits reasonable assessment of the existence of economically recoverable reserves.

Accumulated costs in relation to an abandoned area are written off in full against profit in the year in which the decision to abandon the area is made.

When production commences, the accumulated costs for the relevant area of interest are amortised over the life of the area according to the rate of depletion of the economically recoverable reserves.

A regular review is undertaken of each area of interest to determine the appropriateness of continuing to carry forward costs in relation to that area of interest.

Costs of site restoration are provided over the life of the facility from when exploration commences and are included in the costs of that stage. Site restoration costs include the dismantling and removal of mining plant, equipment and building structures, waste removal, and rehabilitation of the site in accordance with clauses of the mining permits. Such costs have been determined using estimates of future costs, current legal requirements and technology on an undiscounted basis.

Any changes in the estimates for the cost are accounted on a prospective basis. In determining the costs of site restoration, there is uncertainty regarding the nature and extent of the restoration due to community expectations and future legislation. Accordingly the costs have been determined on the basis that the restoration will be completed within one year of abandoning the site.

Intangibles

a) Goodwill

Goodwill is initially recorded at the amount by which the purchase price for a business exceeds the fair value attributed to its net assets at the date of acquisition. Purchased goodwill is amortised on a straight-line basis over the period of 20 years. The balance is reviewed annually and any balance representing future benefits for which the realisation is considered to be no longer probable is written off.

b) Patents and Trademarks

Patents and Trademarks are valued in the accounts at cost of acquisition and are amortised over the period in which their benefits are expected to be realised.

Foreign Currency Transactions and Balances

Foreign currency transactions during the period are converted to Australian currency at the rates of exchange applicable at the dates of the transactions. Amounts receivable and payable in foreign currencies at the balance date are converted to the rates of exchange ruling at that date.

The gains and losses from conversion of short-term assets and liabilities, whether realised or unrealised, are included in profit from ordinary activities as they arise.

Exchange differences arising on hedged transactions undertaken to hedge foreign currency exposures, other than those for the purchase and sale of goods and services, are brought to account in the profit from ordinary activities, when the exchange rates change.

Any material gain or loss arising at the time of entering into hedge transactions is deferred and brought to account in the profit from ordinary activities, over the lives of the hedges.

Costs or gains arising at the time of entering hedge transactions for the purchase and sale of goods and services, and exchange differences that occur up to the date of purchase or sale, are deferred and included in the measurement of the purchase or sale.

Gains and losses from speculative foreign currency transactions are brought to account in the profit from ordinary activities, when the exchange rate changes.

Employee entitlements

Provision is made for the liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee entitlements payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash out flows to be made for those entitlements.

Contributions are made by Bexley Financial Services Limited to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

Bexley Financial Services Limited does not record, as an asset or a liability, the difference between the employer established defined benefit superannuation plan's accrued benefits and the net market value of the plans assets.

Bexley Financial Services Limited operates an ownership-based remuneration scheme, details of which are provided in the Notes to Accounts. Profits or losses incurred by employees, being the difference between the market value and the par value of the shares acquired, are not recorded as remuneration paid to employees.

Provision for Warranties

Provision is made in respect of the economic entity's estimated liability on all products and services under warranty at balance date. The provision is based on the economic entity's history of warranty claims.

Debt Defeasance

Where assets are given up to extinguish the principal and all future interest of a debt and differences in the carrying values of assets foregone and the liability extinguished are brought to account in the profit from ordinary activities. Costs incurred in establishing the defeasance are expensed in the period that the defeasance occurs.

Where only part of a debt is extinguished the interest and principal are defeased proportionately and a liability recognised for the net present value of the remaining future interest and principal repayments. The discount factor applied is that implicit in the original debt.

In all cases where defeasance occurs, it is highly unlikely that the company will again be required to pay any part of the debt or meet any guarantees or indemnities associated with the debt.

Cash

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash includes cash on hand and in all call deposits with banks or financial institutions, investments in money market instruments maturing within less than two months, net of bank overdrafts.

Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking in to account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established. Dividends received from associates and joint venture entities are accounted for in accordance with the equity method of accounting.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Converting Preference Shares

Converting preference shares are brought to account on issue at the value of net proceeds received. The converting preference shares are compound financial instruments where the dividends are at fixed amounts with scheduled dates of payments and the number of ordinary shares to be issued on conversion is in part determined by the market price of ordinary shares at date of conversion. The present value of the interest and principal payable on conversion are discounted at the market rate of interest at issue date and are brought to account as borrowings. The difference between the net proceeds received and the borrowings component is brought to account as equity. Dividends paid on the converting preference shares are recognised as interest expense in the profit from ordinary activities.
