The High Street Bells Choir entertained guests as they arrived, the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre Catering provided fabulous food and service and our special guest speaker, CEO of the Abbotsford Convent Foundation Maggie Maguire, shared her valuable experience and insights on the importance of community.

However, the highlight of the evening was hearing about some of the exciting projects to be undertaken by the diverse array of community organisations who received our grants. Here are just a few of them:

African Kids Reading Club

A program designed to aid refugee and humanitarian entrant children from African backgrounds, many of whom live in public housing. Children aged four to 10 years are assisted with reading and school work whilst their parents are empowered to take the lead and strengthen their child's ability to read in a family environment.

Fitzroy Learning Network 'Women's Wellbeing Project'

The program consists of weekly wellness classes, such as dance, yoga and tai chi, to encourage improved health and well-being for refugee, asylum seeker and migrant women. The aim is to help amend the isolation faced by many of these women and provide an opportunity for them to build trusting relationships.

Appreciation of support

The Rotary Club of Albert Park held an awards event in March to thank some of the key organisations, including the Clifton Hill/North Fitzroy **Community Bank®** Branch, that have provided a valuable contribution to their organisation.



Guest speaker Tim Costello, one of Australia's leading voices on social justice issues, spoke to the large audience of members and guests on a number of themes and shared many interesting anecdotes and observations. In particular, he spoke about the importance of giving to those in need and bringing about social cohesion, praising Rotary for their ongoing commitment and wide range of work in this area.

Residents from Quin House, a supported accommodation for men recovering from alcohol and drug addiction, participate in weekly photography workshops with Pia Johnson. The workshops encourage collaboration and communication whilst enhancing self-esteem and skill acquisition. An exhibition of participant's photographs, accompanied by a public health forum, took place in June during Drug Action Week at the Collingwood underground car park.

City of Yarra 'Act Now Change Lives'

A project that works with young people aged between 10 and 14 years who live in the Collingwood Housing Estate, particularly targeting young people in danger of entering the judicial system. Predominantly sport based, this project provides participants with positive outlets for adolescent energy with obvious physical benefits and develops socialisation, discipline, self respect and goal setting.

On 1 July, Clifroy Ltd moved its share listing from the Bendigo Stock Exchange (BSX) to the National Stock Exchange (NSX), and at the same time Boardroom Pty Ltd took over as our share registry provider from AFS & Associates. All shareholders should have received a letter providing full details about these changes. If you did not, please contact Boardroom (toll free) on 1300 737 760.

Our listing on the NSX exposes Clifroy shares to a larger market with more brokers available to buy and sell your shares. Later in this issue we provide some information about the real value of your Clifroy shares in the current period of low fixed interest and property returns. The NSX provides the mechanism for buyers and sellers to execute a transaction on market terms with a modest broker's fee (payable on execution of transaction) being the only cost.

As always we hope you enjoy this latest newsletter, and we welcome your feedback on any issue relating to our activities as your local **Community Bank**[®] branch.

us do more by joining our Board. Despite her short tenure, Aisling added a sharp and financially savvy input to our deliberations, and earned the praise of our Auditors for her forensic accuracy in reviewing their work.

By the time you read this, she and her partner will be piloting their Land Cruiser somewhere in the great northern expanses of Australia, with the intention of completing the round trip within a year or so. We wish her well, and thank her for her contribution.

Recognise the value in Clifroy shares

Since 2008 and the Global Financial Crisis, it seems as though sharemarket volatility is now a permanent fact of life.
