From the Chairman



As the end of the financial year approaches, it is especially pleasing to report to you how well your Community Bank is progressing. This is despite unforeseen stumbling blocks that your Board has worked hard to mitigate with the support of our staff.

COVID-19 has seen alterations to the way daily business has been

conducted and, as the severity of this awful pandemic is progressively understood, I am appreciative of how the staff have remained positive in providing banking services for our communities in Harden Murrumburrah and Grenfell.

More generally, it is wonderful how our local community has responded to and accepted the measures that government has implemented. These measures appear to be working which is all we can hope for until a permanent cure and prevention can be found.

As a result of the restrictions, in April our Community Bank partnered with the Kruger Trust and Rotary to hastily put together a financial relief package for businesses severely impacted in our community to help tide them over. The criteria and distribution was arranged by Harden Regional Development Corporation and more than 20 recipients were helped through the emergency.

The budget has been put together for this coming financial year with a very cautious approach as the nation is now officially in recession. The task of adhering to it will be under constant review by the Board.

It has also been awkward juggling sponsorships as some events are being cancelled for this year, some delayed, and the future of others we have committed to remains unsure.

With official interest rates at an all-time low and the pandemic far from over, we are fortunate to report locally we have just experienced one of the best autumns in recent history. Cropping was done exactly on time; it is nearly more expensive to buy a few crumbed cutlets than a lobster, reflecting the healthy prices for lamb.

Harden, by and large, is looking very progressive. The showground has been transformed with new buildings. Soon the new hospital will be functioning. The new Rural Fire Service headquarters is stealing the view of new facilities being constructed at the racecourse. And to top it off, the magnificent new grandstand and changerooms at McLean Oval will be the envy of every visiting team.

The future looks about as positive as it possibly could be and the bank is right in the thick of it helping to make it happen.

Finally, our heartfelt congratulations to a grand lady Rose Adler who received a Medal of the Order of Australia in the Queen's Birthday Honours. Her service, given freely to so many local community organisations and her church, is a wonderful credit to her.
