Dreamhouse Theatre Company - received \$5,000


Dreamhouse is a not-for-profit theatre company for Peninsula based young people aged 5-21. They aim to empower and inspire a love of the performing arts in young members, and to celebrate the artistic contribution that they make to our community. In normal years, Dreamhouse would offer workshops, live improvisation activities, intergenerational story sharing events, training from professional teaching artists, and culminate in a big live production. In lockdown, Artistic Director Carole Patullo was able to keep the group going with zoom workshops. This helped provide not only the creative expression for the teens involved, but also a critical social connection to help them through what could have been a very lonely and disorientating time. Dreamhouse even managed to create an innovative final production, 'Darker' filmed on iPhones and shared as split screen live performance. A great example of collaboration and innovative solutions. Thanks to the



lessening of restrictions, Dreamhouse has been able to hold the final workshops for the year, outdoors in real life, and will be offering summer holiday theatre skills workshops in late January for school aged children.

Sean M. Whelan, Poet Laureate of the Mornington Peninsula.



Your Community Banks building thriving communities

Most local people would be familiar with the role that Community Bank Rye, Rosebud and Dromana play in supporting sports groups, schools and other community groups. But you might not be aware of some of the longer term and large projects that the branches have been involved with.

Accommodation for adults with disabilities: \$275,000 Seed Funding



This purpose-built facility offers accommodation for adults with disabilities currently in the care of aging parents. Built on land donated by the Uniting Church, your Community Bank Rye, Rosebud and Dromana were the first to offer financial support to this important venture with \$275,000 seed funding. This initial contribution was

instrumental in getting the project going, and has been furthered with State and Federal government funding and volunteer contributions.

Years in the making, this project has faced numerous challenges, from adhering to strict building requirements, to slow downs associated with COVID-19. At last all the persistence of the development team is paying off, with doors opening to the first residents this December - just in time for Christmas! Accommodation such as this plays a vital role in offering adults with disabilities independence and dignity. The facility contains eight units and still has some available.
