Mirboo North & District Community Bank Branch AGM and Grants night – 30 October 2019.

Another exciting financial year has passed for our Community Bank branch with in excess of \$85,000 contributed back to the community in grants, donations and sponsorship. At a well organised event on 30 October, the Mirboo North & District Community Bank Branch held its combined AGM and Grants night.

This year Warren Warner has taken on the role as Chair of Strzelecki Ranges Community Enterprises Limited (the company holding the Bendigo Bank franchise and trading as Mirboo North & District Community Bank Branch), after the resignation of former Chair, Kerry Peachey. Warren's drive and passion will assure the continued excellent progress of the company.

Importantly, Warren pointed out, "The Strzelecki Ranges company employs the Community Bank branch staff and manages the franchise. This involves the Board managing the annual budget, human resources, the property, marketing and advertising, business and development, and overall governance. I always stress that it's the Branch Manager and staff who deal exclusively with customers; the Board has no knowledge of individual customers' banking. We Directors are only aware of the aggregate amount that customers' business generates."

Warren confirmed a fully franked dividend of 5 cents which is 5% on shareholders' investment and thanked shareholders for their trust and support. He also mentioned that thanks to the loyal customers, staff and Board it has been possible for \$1.036 million to be contributed back to the community in the form of grants, sponsorships and donations since the Community Bank branch's inception.

The AGM saw the election of new Director, Kerry Ives to the Board. Kerry will be an excellent addition to the business with a long list of experience in both the public and private sector. Marg Lynn was farewelled from the Board; her expertise in many areas



over the years has seen consistent growth of the business. Marg will become Ambassador for the Community Bank branch and in this capacity her knowledge and expertise can still be drawn upon. She will make a fine representative of the company.

Branch Manager, Alan Bannister, highlighted the excellent progress the Community Bank branch has made since opening in 2010 with substantial growth and a good gain in customer numbers. Alan thanked the staff who continue to provide friendly, professional service and are the branch's biggest asset. After thanking Directors, shareholders and the community, Alan encouraged all to recommend the Community Bank branch to the businesses and groups they are involved with to ensure that new customers continue to be gained.

After the official AGM business concluded, Jan Head, Chair of the Grants Committee, began the exciting presentation of the grants with Directors and staff handing out nine grants to the lucky community groups. Grants were awarded to community groups in the districts of Mirboo North, Boolarra and Yinnar.

It was truly inspiring to hear about the projects the grant recipients had selected. One such project was replacing lower weather boards on the Budgeree Hall with cement sheeting and building a small verandah, to fire proof the building. The hall is situated in a wildfire area and narrowly missed being razed in the March 2019 fires. Another was ARC Yinnar, a unique centre for creativity and contemporary arts, receiving a grant to remove asbestos enabling the commencement of a much needed re-development of the building. Here in Mirboo North our beloved Op Shop's grant assisted the purchase of retail premises to provide improved fund raising opportunities to the many community groups who use the Op Shop.

Mirboo North Lions Club for their recent motorcycle event, the Allambee South Community Centre for a ride-on mower, Budgeree Hall Reserve Committee for fire prevention work, Boomerang Bags for the "Sew Safe –Sew Happy" project, Mirboo North and District Historical Society for an extension to their filing system, Mirboo North ArtSpace for improvements to the display area, Mirboo North Golf Club for enhancement of the outdoor area, Yinnar & District Pre-School for the garden project, ARC Yinnar for removal of asbestos, and Mirboo North Op Shop towards the purchase of their permanent premises. In total, in excess of \$40,000 was awarded for these fantastic projects.

100th student driver passes thanks to L2P Program.



My Name is Rob Reynolds and I have been involved with the South Gippsland Shire L2P Program since it began many years ago.

I volunteered for the program after I saw an article in the Mirboo North Times seeking mentors to assist learner drivers to obtain their 120 hours of driving – John Ernst was the co-ordinator at the time.

The program had one vehicle to do the training and was based in Leongatha which involved me driving to Leongatha picking up the vehicle then driving back to Mirboo North to pick up the student.

Over time people from Mirboo North, with the involvement of the Mirboo North & District Community Bank Branch, raised enough money to purchase our own vehicle which was fantastic, saving mentors many hours of driving to pick up the car!

I really enjoy helping the learners to get their hours up and many students have obtained their licence through this program, in fact I was extremely fortunate to put the 100th student through to obtain their P plate licence.

In helping the learner to obtain their hours I found it also assisted me with my driving skills – 'practice what you preach'.

A program of this nature is time consuming and expensive however, if it helps to save lives, money and time is irrelevant. We have found that the students are very appreciative of the program and the mentor's time.

While driving around we also find some road laws are, to say the least, confusing and sometimes conflicting or ambiguous in their meaning which are good talking points.

All in all, this entire project is a great success in helping students drive competently ensuring greater driver safety on our roads.

If you know of a local L-Plater who is struggling to get enough driving time, speak to the L2P Coordinator at the South Gippsland Shire to see if they are eligible to access the program. We currently have local mentors who have spare capacity.

Vital Signs coming soon.

The project that has been taking the pulse of our communities: Mirboo North, Boolarra and Yinnar, as well as Thorpdale, will launch its report card in February.

The Mirboo North & District Community Bank Branch and the Mirboo North and District Community Foundation joined forces to explore the data on the themes of health, education, the environment, the economy, and belonging.

Each of the four communities will have their own multi-coloured, highly readable two-pager that distils a vast amount of information. The reports are not the end but rather the beginning of a process aimed at addressing the issues uncovered. It will provide the communities, as well as the Foundation and the Community Bank branch, with direction on the sorts of projects that can be planned and funded.

For instance, we have confirmation that mental health is of major concern but we have a lower proportion of psychologists than Victoria. We know that sugar-sweetened drinks are consumed at a higher rate than in Victoria as a whole. We have a higher rate of participation in apprenticeships and traineeships than the State average and a lower rate of university enrolment. We have a lower unemployment rate than in Victoria, and a higher self-employment rate. We divert more of our waste to recycling than Victorians do as a whole, and we have more rooftop solar than Victoria. Our sense of belonging to our communities is enhanced by the high level of volunteering and belief that people will help their neighbours. Our communities are loved for their activities, their inclusiveness and their natural beauty.

New look for Rail Trail.

A few years back the Grand Ridge Rail Trail Committee decided to make a concerted long-term effort to enhance the Rail Trail, and make it more attractive to users. The strategy to date has basically involved rehabilitating the heritagelisted aqueducts (culverts) and updating the signage for some of the attractions along the Trail.

This month has seen the fruits of another facet of the long-term plan: namely, the installation of the first of a series of Warm-up Pods on the Trail. They comprise static exercise


equipment (push-ups, step-ups etc) to help users to warm-up and warm-down as part of an overall exercise regime. These Pods are not playground equipment - they are purely for fitness and recreation, and have no moving parts. The second Pod will be installed at the Mirboo North end of the Trail in coming weeks. A third Pod is planned for the Boolarra entrance to the Trail (STCA).

New signs, in the general style of the Historical Society signs on Ridgway, have been installed at the 'Last Train' picnic area and the 'Warriors Walk' fern gully. There are also signs at the horsewatering area and the Big Tree.

Work on the culvert restoration is continuing in the stretch between Darlimurla and Boolarra, and we also expect to start sprucing-up the Meadows area once the weather becomes more amenable.
